Dear Mayor and Council (and Parks):

This little thread post explains it all (following)... More reason for mountain biking to be contained, away from hiking areas. Everybody hikes, but not everybody mountain bikes... There are far more hikers, than mountain bikers (but many avoid MTB/multi-use trails. The addition of that "Monster" Fromme Parking lot, with another parking lot proposed for the Braemar area, drives the quote: "Build it and they will come..." Stay tuned for more biker-hiker conflicts. I dont even hike in the forest across my street, anymore....I now have to drive my car to go hike where there are no mountain bikes permitted. But, even then, a hiker may encounter a scofflaw MTBer on those trails, too.

"Thank you" Mayor and Council. It's a lovely Pandora's Box of "delights" you have opened up over the past few years... It's clearly not working... It's always been a <u>very bad idea</u> from the word "get-go". But, it never seems to be the mountain bikers' fault in DNV's "rose-coloured" MTB world. And it's a tragedy waiting to happen...

A now-retired Parks employee told me a few years ago, that it would have to take the <u>death</u> <u>of a child via a MTB-related incident</u> that will become the "Game-Changer". (Those words will come back to haunt you, if you do not get a handle on the over-entitled MTB scene, soon!) With the growing numbers of hikers and bikers on narrow trails, there is a serious accident waiting to happen. Even Whistler does not allow hiking on their "gnarly" MTB trails. And MTBers should stay off hiking trails, like the BP, which they have poached in "Hiking Only" portions of the trail, also. Why must hikers remain vigilant for speeding bikers, while on a quiet hike/nature walk to get away from the maddening crowds, in the first place?

I hope that this tragedy will not become a fact \*\*before\*\* DNV works diligently and responsibly to actually contain, manage and enforce this wily MTB sport that has taken over our public forests with a vengeance.

Is DNV still insisting on playing a losing game of Russian Roulette with peoples' safety and well-being on the trails, in order to keep appeasing the minority extreme mountain biking cult? Our forests should not remain sprawling Abusement Parks for a MTB "thugride" in the woods. Build it and they will keep coming, indeed. The ball is now in your court, DNV.
